Have you ever had an experience in your daily life where you've encountered a veteran who either was in our same unit or was in the same area of Vietnam at about the same time we were? You just never know when you'll be surprised or reminded just how small the world can be. Here's what happened to me recently:

I belong to a running group, which is currently training for a marathon. During one of our long training runs, I began talking with one of our runners in our group. Since it was a long run and he seemed to be hurting, I came along side of him and asked him how he felt. He laughed and said that he had not taken care of his body earlier in his life and that "eating e-rations for 23 years" had taken its toll on his body.

Well, now I was really interested. As we continued to talk, I discovered that he was an Airborne Ranger and that he served in Vietnam in 1971. I asked what area he was in and he said, "...vou probably won't know the areas since they were really small." He went on to say that he was in Qui Nhon, Bong Son and Phu My! As it turns out, he was attached to the 173rd Airborne Brigade and even spent time at LZ Uplift!!! He also remembered that his company worked with a "battalion of APCs" and that their firepower was awesome!

Another chance encounter occurred while I was having lunch at a local restaurant. As my group and I were preparing to leave the restaurant, two individuals came in wearing Vietnam Veteran hats and jackets.

I approached them, introduced myself as a fellow Vietnam Veteran and spoke about our unit, the areas and dates of our service. I went on to talk about the recent trip to Vietnam that some of us had taken.

They gave me their cards and it turned out that both belonged to the Military Order Of The Purple Heart. When I spoke about our organization and our newsletter, they expressed interest and asked if they could include an article about their organization into our newsletter. I assured them that our members would love to hear about their organization. So look for some information in future newsletters.

For any current Life Member who sponsors three new members during the same time period, or encourages three members who are in arrears to bring their account up to date, they will receive a pair of unit crests.


There are a limited number of crests available, so this is based on a first come-first served basis until supplies run out. I will have several pairs of crests available for sell at the price of: \$7.00 each, or

ON LEADERSHIP

Recently I have been involved in teaching some classes on leadership to varied organizations in Wyoming and it occurred to me that we are in the process of changing leadership within the Association and an update to the general membership is in order. The change that is occurring is not one of revolution, but evolution. As I explained in my first communication after assuming the office of president, I don't anticipate any radical change, and there hasn't been any to date, nor do I anticipate any in the future. Change is, however, inevitable and this organization is no exception. Your executive committee has approved some changes in the past few months and I would like to share them with you. Most have been of a routine nature, having to do with fixes to our Constitution and Bylaws. Both documents are available for viewing on our website at www.ichibanl.org.

Others are more organizational in nature and they involve the distribution of responsibilities to various individuals. One of the most far-reaching has been the move of Association Founder, Ken Riley to that of Chairman Emeritus from Treasurer. Ken simply has too much institutional knowledge to relegate him to a single office. The Executive Committee therefore agreed to the establishment of this exalted position, without specific duties, so we may maximize his worth to the benefit of all. In this capacity, he will serve as mentor and advisor to all officers, providing us with his corporate experience and expertise. In effect, we have replaced Ken with about ten others in the structure because the Association has grown exponentially both in size and complexity. Chuck McAleer who has a solid background in financial management has replaced Ken as the Treasurer. Chuck will do a great job and his expertise is welcomed.

We also have a new Webmaster, Ray Sarlin has replaced Chris Lange and is doing a remarkable job on the website. If you haven't visited the site recently, please do so. You will be pleasantly surprised at the additions Ray has made. Thanks Ray and welcome aboard.

We have also added some new faces in the "head shed". As you know Robert Melendez is the new editor of the newsletter you are reading. Jim Edwards is donating time and materials to print the newsletter and doing a great job, indeed. We formally established the office of Counselor and Harry Wilson, Attorney At Law, is capably filling that capacity. Harry has secured non-profit status for the Association, not an inconsiderable accomplishment. That means any donations made to the Association may now be tax deductible.

The Executive Committee is in frequent communication and we are slowly but surely assuming all those functions that once were Ken Riley's alone. Frankly, it is a testament to Ken's considerable capacity for this, his labor of love that he functioned on his own for so long. Not many could have done as much for so long and so well.

But the officers of your Association are volunteers, serving without pay of course, and are subject to daily demands from their other interests. (Ever notice how work has a flair for getting in the way of having fun?)

And therefore, I would like to solicit any ideas for improvement in how the Association functions—it is here to serve your needs after all. We are working hard, but virtue of position does not mean we have all the answers. Remember when we used to complain about "those bastards up at battalion/brigade/division?" Now is your chance to have your voice heard.

Some of my thoughts on the process for effecting change:

- Leadership begins with values. Our values will shape the Association and yours are important
 to and need to be considered in the process. Before jumping off the deep end, I will seek
 input from the other officers. As long as we are in agreement, I feel confidant we are doing
 the right thing. Feel free to disagree if you see us doing something you believe to be a
 mistake.
- 2. Change can be hard work. Just because it is easier to continue doing things in the ways we have become accustomed does not justify not changing when necessary. As we transition the duties from Ken to various members of the organization, we are experiencing this. Frequently, people will not understand or be slow to understand why change is necessary and that can slow down the process, so it is incumbent on the officer's of the Association to ensure all members are aware of change and understand the necessity for it. Let us know if you don't understand.
- Leadership is a team sport. No one person can do it all. Leadership is not about controlling from the top: it is about empowering people to do what they are capable of doing. Growing people is the hallmark of a successful organization.
- 4. Learn from doing. By listening to others we will learn to do things better and by doing things better, we improve the organization. One of my goals when I pass the mantle of leadership to my successor is of having operating procedures for all Association functions in place so the transition is as painless as possible.
- 5. An organization has only so much energy. Most of that energy is focused on performing the activities at hand. We must look forward and anticipate future needs however. That is sometimes difficult "it's hard to keep in mind your task is to drain the swamp when you are ass deep in alligators". When this slate of officers leaves office, there will be ample room for improvement but we should have an idea what remains to be done so our successors won't have to discover that on their own.

An idea that came from Darrell Sourwine is an example of 5, above and is worth looking into. Darrell's idea is the formation of a Hall of Fame. Great idea but one that will require a lot of work determining the recommendation criteria; selection criteria and a myriad of other questions would have to be answered how many inductees initially? How many each year thereafter? Is it a nominative process? Do we need a selection committee or does the Executive Committee decide? Or is selection determined by a vote of the general membership? There are probably other questions that will come up, but you get the idea. It is something I believe we should pursue and I would like to hear from anyone who has thoughts on how to proceed. If you disagree, I would like to know that as well.

As you read this. I hope one thread of thought appears throughout and that is that any successful organization ultimately comes to the conclusion that the answers lie in its people. The members of an organization that wish to see it grow and be successful must have a passion for what they are about. They must have a sense of becoming better, not content with just being what they are. There must be a vision that is grounded in values and supported by people who believe in it. Finally, there must be an environment that fosters the belief in people, without whom all else is meaningless. Leadership always comes down to people. Thank you for being a valued member of the Association and please, exercise your rights as a member to make this a better organization.
